Vashon-Maury Veterans

Vashon-Maury Island has a long and rich history of islanders who have served our country. On Veterans Day it is appropriate to recognize our veterans and to recognize that the Islands have always celebrated it veterans.

Vashon was originally settled by many Civil War veterans, almost all of them veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR). In 1889 only 14 islanders came from former Confederate States, while 272 came from Union states. It is not that Southerners as settlers were not welcome, but they were not encouraged either. The chain migration – settlers bringing friends and family along, or sending for them once settled – that made Vashon a haven for Union veterans, also made Darrington, Washington a haven for Confederate veterans.

The photo of the Civil War Union Veterans, members of the H.G. Sickles, Post 57, Grand Army of the Republic, was taken in 1895. The Post was organized June 14, 1890 with George Fuller as its first Commander. The Post was named for Colonel Horatio G. Sickles, who commanded the Pennsylvania Reserve Volunteer Corps 32nd Regiment from Bucks County, Pennsylvania; not the

infamous Major General Daniel Sickles of Gettysburg fame whose shattered leg bones and the cannon ball that struck him are on display at the National Museum of Health and Medicine.
