





Youngsters in Bosnia Are Used to Disseminate Information, Since Printed Sheet le Unknown.

Bosnian children of the Mohammedan faith have perhaps the most remarkable memories and aptitude for languages of any children in Europe. Despite the fact that the percentage of illiteracy among the Bosnian Mohammedans is very high, the memories of the children have become remarkably developed by the memorizing of thousands of prayers. Some of the children are also used by the villages as "walking newspapers." The brightest boys go to a coffee house where a Mohammedan, speaking in a high clear voice, translates the latest news from the Ser-

The boys listen attentively and then go out on their "paper routes." When they enter a village on their route the town crier beats a drum er about the boy. (The women usually are working in the fields while their lords drink coffee and fermented plum juice at the town cafe). The little "walking newspaper" then performs his feat of memory. Word for word he repeats what he heard translated to him. His pay consists

GRAZING IN NATIONAL FORESTS.

The demand for range on the national forests was greater the last year than ever before in the history of the forest service, which branch of the United States department of agriculture has control of these tracts. Especially in the droughtstricken regions, stockmen using the unreserved public domain or private pastures eagerly sought forest permits in order to save their stock. The value of the system of range regulation in use has been so thoroughly demonstrated that representative stockmen from all the Western states have declared emphatically in favor of placing the remaining unreserved public lands under federal control and having them managed under a plan similar to that in effect on the national forests.

OIL FOR PARIS.

The French government has apline for oil between Havre and at Wenatchee.

Paris, 150 miles. One of the lines of ten-inch diameter will be used for heavy fuel oils, and the other, a smaller pipe line of four inches, for petroleum and motor spirit. It is estimated that 4,500 tons of heavy and 1,000 tons of light oil and spirit can be pumped through these lines daily, thus helping to meet the problem of the coal supply of Paris. New York Ferry Guard Declares the Birds Devour More Than Their Weight in a Day.

MIVER GULLS GREAT EATERS

Those who complain about the cold, increasing coal bills and other troubles resulting from spring weather long deferred will do well to consider the ways of sea gulls wintering along the Hudson and East

Guards on the Hudson ferries declare that one reason the gulls can weather it with comfort on an ice cake in zero weather is their ability to store away food.

"I don't know how they put in the nights, but daytime is dinnertime for the gulls along this route," said an observing guard on an Eric ferry. according to the New York Evening Sun. "I know several gulls that are wintering here by their markings and they average a mouthful of some food or other every two minutes. There are about elevenhours of daylight now and you can figure it for yourself that means about 330 mouthfuls a day. Some of these bites are so big the bird has to stand on an ice cake and jerk its neck to swallow. Consider that the average bite is half an ounce, then the birds must cat ten pounds of food, or more than their own weight, every day."



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

STRONG LIGHT REVEALS DUST

Rays Simply Make Visible the Millions of Motes That Are Always Floating in Air.

Even yet there are some housewives who carefully exclude from their homes the health-giving sunlight on the ground that "it raises the dust!" For proof they will admit a beam of light and then point triumphantly to the millions of dust motes which become visible.

It is impossible with the naked eye to see dust particles by ordinary or diffused light, but when the particles are highly !!luminated, as by a beam of sunlight coming into a room or the rays of an electric searchlight, they are visible, but they were there just the same before they were disclosed. Doubters who would cling to the sunlight-anddust theory bould try throwing a powerful electric ray into a room at midnight. There will be disclosed just as many dust particles in the air as the sun would disclose at midday.

If it were not for the atmospheric dust, we would not see the characteristic beams from searchlights or the sunbeams as they are so frequently depicted by artists.

WOOD LEADS IN LITERARY

Leonard Wood Is More Than 9,000 Votes Ahead of Nearest Competitor.

DIGEST

In its attempt to learn the composte choice of the nation for nominaion for president, the Literary Digest or the week of April 24 publishes the second installment of its presidential soll of 11,000,000 voters. The returns include 149,604 votes. Leonard Wood continues to hold a big lead.

Wood has 32,351; Hoover, 22,908; Johnson, 22,609; Harding, 10,432; Hughes, 5,022; Lowden, 6,449; Taft, 3,400. Among the Democrats, Edwards gets 7.568; McAdoo, 6,740; Wilson, 6,491; Cox, 5,649; Bryan, 3,885.

Hoover receives a Democratic vote of 9,974 which is larger than the Democratic vote cast for any avowed Dem ocrat. McAdoo has the first place in the declared Democratic vote with 5,613 and Wilson is second with 5,342. The xote continues to come mainly from Ohio, New York, New Jersey. California, Texas and Washington.

New York Leans Ever Woodward. New York, April 24.- Although the people of Ohio will actually vote for the selection of only 48 delegates to the Chicago convention at the polls on April 27, the result of their balloting will materially influence 88 delegates from New York state at nomination

A poll of the Empire state's 88 delegates, elected on April 6, shows that they are for the strongest candidate. with a leaning toward General Wood because he is in the tead. The remarkable showing General Wood made in Illinois against Governor Lowden has boosted his stock with the 88 New Yorkers and they are now watching Ohlo, If General Wood makes as good a showing against Senator Harding in Ohio as he did against Governor Lowden, this fact will practically insure the vote of the 'ew York delegation

John J. Lyons, a leading News Ork delegate elected to go to Chicago, said "Two things are certain about the New York delegation: First, it is not for Senator Johnson, because all the Johnson pledged candidates for delegates were beaten by three to one or worse in the recent primary election: second, it is going to vote for the man, who is nominated. At present it looks like Wood is going to be nominated, for he has split the delegation in one favorite son's state and it looks like he has a chance to split another favorite son's native state's delegation If he does the New York delegation will regard him as the man most likely to get the nomination and will support him after a complimentary first ballot for Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, A recent poll showed Wood was the first choice of 75 per cent of the people of New York state, and if to this sentiment is added the Illinois outcome and a similar result in Ohio; it can readily be understood why Wood would stand ace high with the New York delegation,"

REBELS CAPTURE MEXICAN TOWNS

American Destroyers Move to Southern Waters to Await Events.

Washington. - With Mexico City, Vera Cruz and Tampico in the hands of the revolutionists, American destroyers were sent to Mexican waters to await eventualities and to afford protection to the American lives in the Mexican gulf ports. This gives, the revolutionists control of practically all of the important cities.

Official confirmation of the fall of the Mexican capital was received by the state department from the American embassy which reported there was no disorder in the capital.

The American embassy report made. no mention of President Carranza, and reports from Vera Cruz said a search there had failed to find him. A report that he had been arrested in Esperanha, state of Vera Cruz, was without confirmation here.

Estimates of the state department place the number of Americans in Mexico at between 6000 and 7000, including radicals and draft evaders who crossed the border to escape the

TREATY THROWN INTO CAMPAIGN

Washington.-The treaty of Vecsailles as it came from Paris has been thrown squarely into the coming presidential campaign.

President Wilson formally has called upon the democratic party to "indorse and support" the treaty and "condemn the Lodge reservations."

Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, the republican leader in the fight to amend the document, has accepted the president's challenge, and political observers here regarded the issue as clearly drawn.

Mr. Wilson's views were stated in a telegram to G. E. Hamaker, of Portland, chairman of the Multnomah county democratic central committee.

With W. J. Bryan insisting that the democrats accept the reservations adopted by a majority of the senate. some observers here expect a sharp fight on the treaty issue at San Francisco, with Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, probably leading the administration forces.





JAPAN IS READY TO TAKE STAND FOR NEW ORDER

Dr. #. H. Scott Predicts Great Future Under Leadership of Young Christians.

MILLIONS FOR NEW SCHOOLS.

Baptists to Spend Huge Sum to Give Christian Training to Young Men and Women of Japan,

Religious leaders in America are watching with interest the struggle going on in Japan between the military and the progressive parties, according to Dr. J. H. Scott, of the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society who is preparing to return to Japan after a year's furlough. For twenty-seven years Dr. Scott has been in the Flowery Kingdom and it is partly on his recommendation that the Baptists have decided to spend a million and a half dollars there between now and April 1924.

Over \$200,000 will be invested in the Mable Memoria! School at Yokohama, while \$400,000 will go to the Christian college at the same place. Practically every dollar of the appropriation for Japan will be used for educational purposes except \$20,000 set apart for fifteen church buildings,

In the present cabinet, largely made up of progressives, Dr. Scott sees the final overthrow of autocracy and milltarism. Old policies are giving way in the face of the modern ideas of the young men and women of Japan, many of whom are Christians, educated in the Christian colleges that have sprung up in Japan within the last

fifty years, he says. "We owe to this progressive antimilitaristic party our strongest moral support, and every assistance to the mission affort in Japan will be a direct contribution to the cause of peace and hasten the coming of the day when the military spirit and the autocratic policy will be no more," said Dr. Scott.

"Japan will lead the Far East in commerce, industry and invention as well as in education and art," he added, "but there is a still greater mission for Japan and that is as a leader in the principles of truth, liberty and righteousness. Not many years ago she was in the grip of a despotle feudal system. She had a cruel caste system under which the man of lower caste had no more rights than a dog. That has been done away with. Her

people once had no religious rights and her women once were mere chattels Wonderful reforms have been accomplished but none more pronounced than the granting of religious freedom to the people and the recognition of women as equals with men."

According to Dr. Scott, Japan bay been unable to build schools fast enough. Ninety-seven per cent of the children of school age are being edu cated. Industrial schools have opened and yearly turn out hundreds of grad uates. In Osaka more than 2,000 girls were graduated last year.

\$76,191,929 TO BE SPENT IN AMERICA

Northern Baptists Plan Huge Sum to Be Devoted to Schools and Colleges.

Although the Northern Baptists are planning practically to double the ex tent of their mission work in foreign fields during the pext five years as a part of the New World Movement, more than three-quarters of the \$100,000,000 they purpose raising in a campaign from April 25 to May 2 will be spen on this side of the Atlantic.

The apportionment made shows \$76. 191,929 will be spent in America, in cluding \$30,010,000 for Baptist schools and colleges, and \$28,808.071 will be devoted to the foreign work of the de nomination for the five-year period

The amount allotted to both home and foreign work is far in excess of any previous expenditure of the de nomination in a like period and the raising of the \$100,000,000 within a single week is regarded by the North ern Baptists as the greatest financial undertaking that they have ever en tered upon. The \$100,000,000 budget includes only the general expension work of the denomination, generally classified as "benevolence," and does not include the budgets of the local churches. In 1918 the total estimated. value of the church property of the churches included in the Northern Baptist Convention was \$114,817,300. The amount raised that year for church ex penses and benevolence was \$17,351. 524. Of this amount \$13,978,982 was for expenses and \$3,372,542 for henevo lence. It will be seen that the \$100, 000,000 which the Buptists are to raise this spring for their five-year program of benevolence means that the largest previous annual contribution of the church for that purpose will be multiplied nearly six-fold.

Thirty-eight Hurt When Electric Cars Hit Head-on Near Portland.

Portland, Ore .- Three women, two children and three men were killed and 38 persons badly injured Sunday morn ing when two Southern Pacific electric trains crashed together head on just outside the city limits of Portland. Several of the injured were so seriously hurt that it is believed they will

not recover. The wreck is alleged to have been caused by the failure of the engineer motorman on the inbound train from Hillsboro to Portland to observe his orders. His train ran past Bertha station, where it was under orders to pass the outbound train from Portland to McMinnville. This engineer, Silas H. Willetts, was killed in his cab when the two trains crashed.



FERTILE SPOTS IN ARABIA

Country Largely Desert, but in the Valleys Figs, Spices and Dates Are Produced.

In physical character, flora and fauna, Arabia is more like Africa than Asia, says a bulletin of the National Geographic society. Josephus called Arabia "a country that joins on Judea," and Roman geographers drew a map of the land that included Mesopotamia and the Syrian desert back of Palestine.

Yemen, the most southerly and most populous of the Arabian provinces, has many arable valleys producing coffee, figs, spices, hides and dates.

For convenience, the ancients divided Arabia into three parts, the Stony, the Desert and the Happy The high interior plateau is occupied by four great deserts, the Syrian, the Nefud, the Ahkaf, and the Dehna. Koweit, the busy port of the Hasa province, from which many cargoes of dates, sponges and a wealth of pearls are shipped, was selected by the Germans as the saltwater terminus of their Bagdad railway. The kaiser's plans, however. were blocked by a clever coup of the British who made a treaty with the sheik of Koweit.

SKELETONS ARE IN DEMAND

Shortage of Osseous Structures of Humanity is Reported-Profitcers Scemingly Got Busy.

This is not really as gruesome as it sounds, remarks a writer in London Answers. The most essential impedimenta of the medical student is a skeleton, and at the moment | WOOD FAR AHEAD IN PRIMAH. there is a considerable dearth in the latter commodity.

Before the war, medical men and students used to purchase the material required for carrying out anatomical examinations from Paris. Now, for some unaccountable reason, the supply has been greatly decreased, and, unhappily, the profiteer has also stepped in. Four or five guineas was the utmost asked for a complete skeleton in prewar times; new the price is at least ten guineas.

A certain humor is lent to the situation by the appearance in medical journals of advertisements asking the loan of a skeleton for a short period! It recalls the savory conversation between Bob Sawyer and his fellow student, Benjamin Allen, at the breakfast table, when Dingley Dellites were regaled with details concerning the competition for the possession of a skull at "Bart's."

AIRSHIP POSSIBILITIES.

Several American commissions have recently made an investigation into the aircraft conditions in different parts of the world, and they agree that the country has the opportunity to lead the world in 'civilian aeronautical activities and as a market for aircraft in 1920. It was the joint opinion of these commissions that the United States is ahead of all other countries in number of planes actually ordered and bought for civilian purposes, number of aerial transportation lines being organized, actual daily performance of the aerial mail service, and volume of mail carried, and possibilities for the use of aircraft for commercial purposes, and that the fact that the post office has proved that military planes can be converted into mail carriers makes possible the utilization of service planes to meet the immediate demand which manufacturers are unable to meet.





FORECAST GREATER WINTER WHEAT YIELD

Washington.-A slightly larger production of winter wheat than had been expected was forecast by the department of agriculture on the basis of the condition of the crop and acreage on May 1.

Total production was estimated at 484,547,000 bushels, or 1,030,000 more than was forecast as of last April 1 This total, however, is about 287,000, 000 bushels less than last year's crop. a decrease of 33.8 per Cent.

There was an improvement of 3.5 per cent la the condition of the crop during the month. During the winter 11.9 per cent of the acreage planted was abandoned, the total acreage remaining to be harvested being placed at 34,165,000.

Warsaw. - Polish cavalry entered the city of Kiev Saturday morning on the heels of the retreating bolsheviki. The infantry kept up its advance towards Kiev, cavalry detachments

keeping contact with the infantry.

There was little fighting, according to reports reaching Polish headquarters in Warsaw, the cavalry going into the city all day as the infantry advanced in a great semi-circle.

A few machine gun shots were fired in the early morning as the cavalry appeared, but this was quickly silenced, and reports say that the evacustion of Kiev began soon afterward.

House Abandons Retail Sales Tax. Washington. - Republican members of the house ways and means committee definitely decided to abandon the proposed 1 per cent retail sales tax for raising part of the money for the proposed soldier relief legislation.

Gibson May be Colby's Aid. Washington.-It is understood on good authority that the post of assistant secretary of state has been offered to Hugh S. Gibson, at present American minister to the new republic of Poland.

Many Famous Masters of Melody Were Very Far From Being Lovers of Its Sweet Sounds.

A great musician is not necessarily a music lover, a fact attested by many great music makers of the masculine gender-for instance, the deaf Beethoven, who was "surrounded by silence like a world walking among men." This master musician once declared that before he lost his hearing in his boyhood he had disliked music so much that his father had to drive him to the practice of the art.

Even Wagner hated a particular brand of music, described by him as a kind that "follows the rules and has no other reason for existence," as he hated also "that whole clinking, glistening show, grand opera!" Berlicz took greater pride in the fact that his requiem mass frightened one of the listeners into a fit than in his masterpiece, and Paganini often said that he would rather be praised for the grace of his bows to his audience than for his musical performance.-Marian Cox, in the Chicago Tribune.

SEEING 'MOVIES' IN DAYLIGH

New Screen Idea Promises to De Away With the Necessity of Darkened Theater.

The public of London, England, is interested in what is known as a Q. E. D. daylight cinematograph screen, whereby with the usual projecting apparatus pictures are produced in daylight equal in definition to those shown in darkened theaters. Heretofore, where this clear definition has been got in daylight, there was required a tremendous amount of electric current, and the consumption of the films has been correspondingly rapid. In the case of the Q. E. D. screen the amount of current for indoor use for daylight or artificial light is no greater than, or is below, the amount normally retheaters. If the invention works out, moving pictures can spread into countries where the natives will not go into darkened buildings, and needless to say the educational uses of moving pictures, both commercially and otherwise, will be multiplied.
